Random Drug Testing

Parent/Community Meeting Wakefield High School

Objectives

- Education/Awareness of illegal drug use
- District responsible for maintaining discipline, health and safety of students
- Commitment to keeping extracurricular programs competitive, safe, and healthy

Objectives

- Show (and not just tell) students that we are serious about illegal drug usage, and it's unacceptable at our school
- Help students say 'No' by having the possibility of being tested
- Educate students on 'real world' and employer requirements
- Being proactive in ensuring students who participate in extracurricular activities represent the district in a positive manner

Identification of Need

- Local/community concern; "common knowledge" or "common perception."
- Local law enforcement reports increased availability of illegal drugs on the streets
- Our students could be and are being exposed to it (tempted) within the community
- Support from Coaches and Administration
- Support from School Board
- Need for Education/Prevention/Awareness

Definitions

- "Participant Pool" (Who are we testing?)
 - Students in grades 7-12 who participate in extra-curricular activities
 - Grades 7 and 8 would be in a separate "pool"
 - All students (7-12) who are in extracurricular activities would sign a consent form (parent signature required also)

"Reasonable Suspicion" testing

 In addition to random drug testing, a student is subject to drug testing at any time when the Administration determines there is individualized reasonable suspicion based upon articulable facts to believe that the student has used a drug.

Definitions

"Random"

- Random sampling of students who participate in extra-curricular activities
- · Random dates and random times of day

"Parental Request"

- Parents have option to voluntarily add their child to the pool
- Parents also have option to request their student be subject to a non-random test, at parents' expense

Drugs Tested

Students may be randomly tested for any drugs, including but not limited to:

- Alcohol
- Amphetamines
- Barbiturates
- Benzodiazepines
- Cocaine
- Methamphetamines
- Marijuana
- Opiates
- Phencyclidine

Extra-Curricular Activities For grades 9-12

Art Club, Baseball, Basketball, District Music Contest Participants, FBLA, FCCLA, FFA, Football, Golf, NHS, One-Act, Pep Band, Quiz Bowl, Speech Team, Student Council, Swing Choir, Track, Volleyball, Wrestling

Procedures

- Administration or the drug testing agency will randomly select students from the master list (students identified only by numbers)
- Selections will be made at random days throughout the school year.

Procedures

- Collection will be conducted in a manner that ensures confidentiality and privacy.
- Collection will be done in school by a nurse registered for specimen collection.
- Non-negative tests will be sent to a lab.
 If non-negative is confirmed at the lab,
 tests will be sent to MRO (Medical
 Review Officer) to confirm results.

Consequences

- Consequences are Cumulative for 7-8, and Cumulative for 9-12
- Offenses "reset" at 9th grade

Ist offense

Student will be suspended from extracurricular activities for 30 school days.

Consequences

2nd offense

- Student will be suspended from extra-curricular activities for 60 school days.
- Student will be required to attend a regularly scheduled School Board meeting and formally request reinstatement in extra-curricular activities program.

Consequences

3rd and subsequent offenses

- Student will be suspended from extracurricular activities for 180 school days
- Student will be required to attend a regularly scheduled School Board meeting and formally request reinstatement in extra-curricular activities program
- Student must obtain a drug/alcohol counseling evaluation and follow said recommendations

Refusal, Tampering, etc.

- If student (and/or parent) refuses to sign consent form, student will be not be allowed to participate in extra-curricular activities.
- If student refuses to submit to test after being randomly chosen, student will be deemed to have submitted a positive test.
- If Administration or MRO finds that the sample has been tampered with, student in suspended from extra-curricular activities for 180 school days.

Parents

- Must sign consent form in order for your student to participate in extra-curricular activities
- If non-negative, you will be contacted
- Can ask for a re-test within 72 hours
- Can file an appeal within 7 school days
- Can request your child to be added to the pool
- Can request for immediate non-random test (parents' expense)

COSTS and other MISC....

- Local clinic supplies testing kits, and bills us \$15 per kit
- We supply bluing agent
- We supply BOTTLED WATER

IMPACT

- ZERO positive tests!!!
- "Reasonable Suspicion" testing sends a strong message to students
- Possible teachable moment about social media
- Community support
- Has lead to further discussion about other drug use and other dangers
